Modern Marriage Is Lecture Topic
 The Birmingham Council of Churches is joining with the First Presbyterian church and the YMCA in bringing Boyd I. Walker, nationally prominent counselor on vocational counseling and marriage problems, to lead a series of four lecture-discussion groups on "Building a Christian Home" with direct emphasis on "Marriage for Moderns."
 The first lecture will be held at 8 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 8, in the First Presbyterian church parlors at North Woodward and Euclid. The theme will be "Choosing for Happiness."
 A 14-minute sound movie showing several hypothetical cases will open the program.
 The second lecture, Dec. 15, will deal with "This Charming Couple," pointing out causes for broken marriage; the false ideals of romantic love on which too many marriages are built.
 The third meeting, Jan. 10 will consider "Who's Boss?", bringing out competition in marriage and showing difficulties of combining business careers with marriage and how, with a little patience, a good balance can be achieved.
 The last meeting Feb. 14 will offer some answers to problems raised in the previous discussions. The theme for this meeting is "Marriage Today."
 The Rev. Robert Graham heads the council's committee working with Walker. The Polygon Club of the First Presbyterian church will be host for the meetings. A book store will be maintained for the purchase of interesting writings on the subjects.
