Harold Haugh to Sing At Benefit Concert

Music lovers are enthusiastically supporting the November 7th concert presenting tenor Harold Haugh, and benefitting both the

Starr Commonwealth and the Birmingham Musicale's scholarship and Music in Hospitals program.

Listed in "Who's Who in Music" and "Who's Who in America," Mr. Haugh has long been in demand as a singer. While studying for the ministry, he was sought by many of the churches in nearby Cleveland, his native city, for vocal performances.

Shortly after his transfer to the Union Theological Seminary in New York City, he was appointed as tenor soloist at the Brick Church there, and commenced his vocal career.

After seven years, as professor of voice and choral director at Joyce's The Glee-club in former Oberlin Conservatory, he came to the University of Michigan, and is now a member of the Faculty

at the University school of music.

AS SOLOIST, he has sung with most of the important choral organizations of the country, including the Handel and Haydn Society of Boston, the Oratorio Society of New York, the Toronto Bach Society, the Winter Park Bach Festival in Florida, The Salt Lake City Oratorio Society, and the Swedish Choral Society of Chicago.

Mr. Haugh has appeared with such orchestras as the Philadelphia Symphony, the Cincinnati Symphony, the National Symphony and the Indianapolis Symphony. He also has appeared at the May Festival in Ann Arbor and the Worcester Festival in Worcester, Mass.

One of the critics has spoken of Mr. Haugh as a "good bet for the Met" and stated that "he is a fine upstanding figure of a man who can emit with ease and power those atmospheric tones for which tenors are paid high fees. He has voice, presence, musicianship, and sympathy."

ACCOMPANYING Mr. Haugh will be Wilbur Perry, also a member of the faculty of the University school of music.
