B'ham Educators To Speak Nov. 19 At R. O. Meeting

In the light of the growing awareness that the education of the entire span of life, rather than being confined to a relatively few years of formal schooling, the annual open meeting sponsored by the Oakland branch of the American Association of University Women will consider "Education—The Nature of the Task" as its topic.

The open meeting will be held at 8 o'clock Monday evening, November 19, at the Longfellow School, 207 Maxwell avenue, Royal Oak.

INCLUDED in the panel of prominent educators are Dr. Dwight B. Ireland and Mrs. Belle Farley Murray.

Dr. Ireland, Superintendent of Schools in Birmingham for the past ten years, will present the nature of the task of education during the "school years".

Dr. Ireland was on the staff of the University of Rochester before coming to Birmingham, and is a member of the National Education Association, the Michigan Education Association, the American Association of School Administrators, the Elementary School Principals Association, and the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

Mrs. Murray will outline education in early years. She was director of religious education at Christ Church Cranbrook for four years, and is at present a lecturer in the Department of Family Relations for the University of Michigan Extension Service.
