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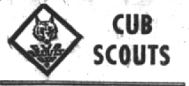
# Inflation

"To stop inflation seemed a big, even impossible, job to the League of Women Voters. Now we are really enthused by the eager eagerness of many people to help and the great response to The Eccentric articles," declared Mrs. Al Riebling.  
Mr. and Mrs. Riebling will be in charge of the Town Meeting on Inflation to be held under League sponsorship at the Community House on Nov. 27.  
The show business background of the Rieblings guarantees that there will be no dull moments at the Town Meeting. Mrs. Riebling, an L.W.V. member, has worked in acting, radio production, writing and advertising, while her husband, now with the Jam Handy Organizations, has also been a theatrical producer and writer.

"INFLATION INTERESTS us as consumers and American citizens," the Rieblings said. "We feel that American business experience and know-how can be applied just as well to the job as a citizen. Inflation is one of the most important topics of the day. It intrudes into every conversation. We believe that fear of rising prices is what makes people buy on credit today rather than save for tomorrow."  
"A Town Meeting in the best way to share opinions, answer questions, perhaps reach solutions. We hear of pressure groups but the greatest source of potential action is the opinion of the American people. Public opinion not only can be, but has been, effective in the past and this meeting will prove that."  
Here is what some more of your neighbors are saying:

William Breesch, 32883 Bingham Lane, (president, Great Lakes Trust Co.)  
Question 1: "What do you think about inflation?"  
"Inflation is very bad. If it continues it will have a decidedly adverse effect on free economy."  
Question 2: "Who do you think has been hurt by inflation?"  
"It has affected everyone. Particularly white collar workers, pensioners, people living on annuities, anyone whose income comes from stocks and bonds."  
Question 3: "Have you been affected by inflation?"  
"Answer: 'Inflation has caused a shortage of investment capital to expand business. High taxes have cut down company earnings to the point where incentive is lost. Fourth quarter business goes almost entirely to the government.'"  
Question 4: "What do you think can be done about inflation?"  
"Answer: 'Reduce government spending. Strengthen our price and wage stabilization laws so that they are effective. Credit controls have not worked and will not work if tried again.'"  
Question 5: "What do you think are the causes of inflation?"  
"Answer: 'Government spending is the main cause of inflation. With the new higher taxes, another cycle of inflation will start. As long as full employment is necessary, demands will be granted and the wage-price spiral will

what matters is how much you money purchases rather than how much money you make. People who have made a lot of money in a short time have not handled it wisely."  
Harrie O. Machus, 1178 North Glenhurst (bakery owner):  
Q. 1: "In my opinion, our inflation is government sponsored and if not retarded will be detrimental to our economy."  
Q. 2: "It seems to me that people with fixed incomes and long-term bond holders are hurt the most."  
Q. 3: "Of course, I think we all have."  
Q. 4: "Nothing, unless the people in government service who sponge off after their plans or are replaced with people who do not believe in fostering inflation."

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## 20th Century Art Collection Being Shown

An exhibit of the collection of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Lewis Winston, 483 Aspen, opened Nov. 9 at the museum of the Cranbrook Academy of Art. The exhibition will continue through Nov. 28. The collection consists of 20th century paintings, drawings and prints emphasizing the abstract phase of modern art, although examples of other leading movements are included. The abstract movement in Paris is represented by Picasso, Braque, Gris and Leger; and French expressionism by Soutine, Rouault and Chagall. German movements can be seen in work by Klee, Kandinsky, Arp and Schwitters.  
Italian painting of the early part of the century is represented by the futurists Severini and Sironi and the forerunner of surrealism,

de Chirico. More recent trends in paintings can be seen by Campigli and Marin. The pure abstractions of the Dutch are seen in the work of Mondrian and Van Doesburg.  
THE MODERN movement in the United States is shown by the paintings of Feininger, Hartley, Merin, Knaths and Pollock. Of special interest are examples of the work of contemporary Michigan artists, Zoltan Sepehy, Wallace Mitchell, Malja Grotell and

Sarkis Sarkian. There also is a group of pre-Columbian sculpture from Mexico, Costa Rica and Peru and several pieces of contemporary sculpture and ceramics.

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Mrs. C. F. Charlton, 119 S. Adams (Community House director of unemployment)  
Q. 1: "Of course, no one knows the answers. If we did, we have a situation which is both vicious and ridiculous."  
Q. 2: "People on fixed incomes, pensioners and white collar workers. The household day-worker has been hurt. Their incomes have not reflected the rise in cost of living. It's hard for them to get more money."  
Q. 3: "Of course. But no more than anyone else."  
Q. 4: "Inflation can only be cured at the individual level. We should not interfere with the natural laws of supply and demand. We should have no controls. People should not get hysterical but live the same as usual. Credit buying is very bad. Advertising also has boosted inflation."  
Q. 5: "People don't realize that



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
