Two Zoning Ord. Recommended by Southfield Zoners

The Southfield township zoning board at a special meeting recommended approval of two zoning ordinances.

One would set up a new zoning classification to be known as regional shopping one zones. This would be the J. L. Hudson Co., to rezone its property in the southeast portion of the township from Ed and commercial one to the new classification.

The zoning board also recommended to the township board that the Hudson zoning request be approved.

BEFORE TOWNSHIP board approval is given, the ordinance must be approved by the county planning board.

The zoning board also recommended approval of a new ordinance regulating topsoil removal in Southfield. It gives the township board authority to issue permits before any topsoil can be removed.

The proposed topsoil ordinance will be considered at the next board meeting, Nov. 27.

To Purchase New Dump Truck In Southfield

Purchase of a new dump truck has been authorized by the Southfield township board. The truck which is equipped with a scraper, will cost approximately \$4,425 and will be purchased from the H. Dawson Co. Necessary funds for the purchase are to be transferred from the general fund to the road maintenance fund. The township will use this truck primarily to haul road gravel. A one and one-half ton truck is now in use.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the Rev. Harvey M. Luce of the Southfield United Presbyterian Church, appearing as a representative of the township ministerial association, pointed out that his group is aware that Southfield is eligible for more liquor licenses because of the population increase. Rev. Luce stated, "We feel that issuance of more licenses would be a detriment to the township and against its best wishes. Our group is taking this opportunity to officially register our feelings." He emphasized that his organization's chief concern was that no more new bars are allowed. Supervisor William Roemer said, the board is aware of the problem and we are doing our best to keep the issuance of licenses at a minimum."

CONSIDERATION of the proposed off-street parking ordinance was tabled until the Nov. 27 meeting.

The board authorized Attorney Oliver Kirk to proceed in a suit against the Michigan Hardware Co., charging the firm with violation of the zoning ordinance.

The township claims the company is violating the ordinance by storing lumber in a garage in a residential zone. The area is in the southeast portion of the township.

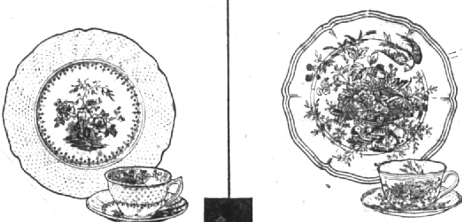
