**Christmas Seals Mailed to 62,000 Oakland Families**

Birmingham residents were among the more than 62,000 Oakland county families who received Christmas seals last week from the Tuberculosis association. Kenneth Gibson, Birmingham dentist and local board member, says the money received from seal sales has helped to provide a permanent chest and x-ray clinic in Pontiac and Royal Oak, to furnish many phases of health education to the public in better able to detect and avoid the disease, local x-ray surveys in industry and the general public, using the Michigan State Health department mobile x-ray units and aid the rehabilitation program at the sanatorium.

DR. GIBSON added, "The seals help to provide a great many other services, too, cooperating with health departments and schools and other agencies." "These services have been a major factor in greatly reducing the ratio of deaths from tuberculosis since the start of the century," he said. "The demands upon our services have been greatly increased and we cannot continue to function without the support of the public."

**Birmingham Police Will Attend Special Classes**

Several members of the Birmingham police department are expected to attend special classes in fingerprint identification and breaking and entering investigations being conducted by the Michigan state police for municipal and state officers and sheriffs' departments.

A series of classes will be held throughout the state beginning next month and continuing through January, 1952. Local men are expected to attend the class at East Lansing on Jan. 10 and 11.

**Attorney Asks Dismissal Of Two Claims Against Local Board of Education**

Harold Howlett, Pontiac attorney representing the Birmingham board of education in the action of two Royal Oak residents to file claims for injury Wednesday morning filed a motion in circuit court for the dismissal of both cases.

Howlett said his request was based on the declaration that a school district, as a governmental unit, could not be held liable for claims of this type.

Suits for \$100,000 and \$200,000 were filed against the board by Miss Irene Gildner and Dr. Maurice Richards, who allegedly received permanent injuries when the bleachers collapsed during the Royal Oak-Birmingham football game here in 1948.

Plaintiffs claim negligence on the part of the board in not having boards or planks under the standards of the bleachers and thus prohibiting their sinking into the soft mud, causing the collapse.

**Episcopal Parish Concludes Series Of Discussions**

A series of 60 meetings held throughout the Christ Church Episcopal parish was concluded recently in Birmingham.

Highlights of the series were the showing of two films, the technical production, "Dust Or Destiny" and a film produced by the Diocese of Michigan by a group of business men headed by W. A. P. John.

Purpose of the series, according to the Rev. Robert DeWitt of Christ Church, Cranbrook, was to bring to the parish members a clearer understanding of "fitting" as it applies to their church and their incomes.

Meetings were held in private homes and the church and all featured an open forum period where discussion of the church's relationship to business and income was held.

The Neighborhood Round Tables began in November, the time of the annual fall church canvass.
