Troy Announces 17 Game Cage Schedule

First official basketball game ever played between Birmingham and Troy high schools is scheduled Friday, Dec. 7 in the new Troy high school gymnasium. This tilt will open Troy's 17 game cage schedule, according to Athletic Director Boyd Larson. Coach Peyton Goodwin said his material this season will be "green but big." Height of squad members will average about 6 feet. Last year's team tied for third place in the Oakland 'B' league.

GOODWIN STATED. "We expect that the squad will develop through the season and should be in very good shape by tournament time." Troy has previously never had gymnasium and was forced to play all games away. The new modern gym is located at the high school on Livermore, just north of Big Beaver road. All varsity home games get underway 7 p.m. with reserve tilts starting at 7.
