Lutheran Group Plans Advent Observances

Beginning Wednesday, Dec. 5, the Lutheran Church of the Ascension will begin its series of four Advent services which will end Dec. 26. The Rev. Paul Shippert will preach four sermons based upon an ancient church hymn, "Oh, Come, Oh, Come, Emmanuel." The entire series will have as their objective, "returning Christ to Christmas."

Rev. Shippert is also asking the congregation to take an active part in reviving the custom of the Advent wreath.

The wreath, itself, evergreen and mounis five candles. Four of these symbolize the 4,000 years during which the world awaited the promised Son of God.

DURING the first week of Advent the first candle is burned for the family worship period in the home. On each succeeding week an additional candle is lighted. On Christmas the fifth, or "Christ candle" is lighted, bringing the wreath to its full beauty.

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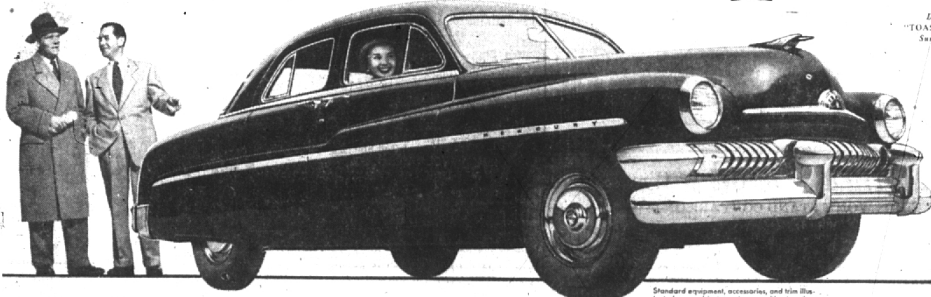
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
