

Reject Plans For Springdale Park Clubhouse

Plans for a new Springdale park building were turned down by the city commission Monday evening. The structure was to have been constructed of slender block with a simple frame roof. Cost had been estimated at eleven to twelve thousand dollars.

Mayer-Dean Beier stated Monday, "I'm still not convinced that this is the cheapest type of building. I had a feeling we were getting into something that was second in importance to a watering system at the park."

"HOWEVER, THE city manager says the watering system will require considerable future work and surveys."

Commissioner Charles Renfrew said, "I'd like to see the replacement of the existing sheds and barns at the south part of the course. I believe this can be done cheaper and we then could use the existing office."

Lance Minor added, "With the present unsettled economic conditions, I'd like to see a decision postponed until after next year."

Since a fire gutted the \$25,000 brick clubhouse in 1943, only a temporary structure has been available.

The proposed building would have served as a combined sales area and service structure.

Future lectures will deal with important features of first aid, treatment of burns, the use of whole blood and plasma, mass hysteria and other phases of volunteer nursing.

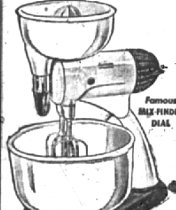
British Elections to Be Topic of Tue. Class

Village Street Improvement to Start in Spring

A contract for street improvements in Bloomfield Village subdivision has been awarded to the Detroit Concrete Products Co., according to Bloomfield Township Supervisor David Anderson.

Roads are to be repaired with a gravel base and covered with a double bituminous treatment. In addition when necessary, concrete curb and gutter will be replaced.
