

Dr. Calhoun To Speak at Ingathering

Dr. Ethel Calhoun, distinguished for her work in the treatment of polio victims, will be the guest speaker at the annual Needlework Guild Ingathering Meeting and breakfast, November 13, at the Birmingham Community House.

With many years of training in the orthopedic field at the University of Minnesota and more specialized training at the Elizabeth Kenny Institute, Dr. Calhoun now concentrates her efforts and wide range of experience as Medical Superintendent of the Elizabeth Kenny Polio Center in Pontiac. A short film dealing with the care of polio patients will augment the session, which begins at 11 a.m.

The Contagious Hospital and Polio Center are among the seven agencies to which the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills branch of the N.G.A. donates new garments each fall.

Delta Delta Delta To Mark Founding At Nov. 14 Dinner

Members of Delta Delta Delta will celebrate Founder's Day with a dinner meeting at Child's (Hayler's) Restaurant in the Fisher Building, Nov. 14, at 6:30 p.m. Reservations are to be made by Nov. 10 with the chairman of each alumnae group. The program will consist of the traditional candle lighting ceremony, reading of the President's Proclamation, and the enacting of a costume skit "Tri-Delta through the Years". The evening alumnae group will do the skit.

Delta Delta Delta was founded at Boston University on Thanksgiving Eve, 1888. Today there are 94 chapters in the United States and Canada.

A national project, supported by both active and alumnae groups is the "General Scholarship Fund". This fund provides a scholarship every year to a woman student at each school where the Tri-Deltas have a chapter. The scholarships are awarded by the Dean of Women and a representative of the sorority.

Michigan alumnae, in addition to contributing to these general scholarships available at the University of Michigan and Michigan State College, also contribute to a scholarship for a Tri-Delt member at each college, and a graduate fellowship for an outstanding Tri-Delt graduate student.

IN ADDITION to supporting these funds, each alumnae group in this area has some project of value to the community on a local level, such as work for the Baptist Children's Home, Children's Hospital, the Red Cross, and service with College Women's Volunteer Services.

In the Detroit Area there are two district Tri-Delt officers and one national officer, Mrs. Ben England of Pontiac Avenue, Birmingham, National Rushing Chairman and chairman of the national convention to be held at Sun Valley, Idaho, the summer of 1952.
