A Parisian beauty of the 1860's will be present at the Oakland county Kappa Delta mothers tea Oct. 18.

She, with her somewhat fabulous wardrobe, will be shown by Miss Jean Lavitt of Grosse Pointe.

The "gown" came from the shop Au Paradis des Enfants shortly after the close of America's Civil War, and has an unusual history.

According to Mrs. S. L. Johnstone, chairman of the tea, the doll was purchased by a Miss Belle Barnard of Buckport, Me., who went to Paris for her trousseau. While there she bought the doll for her younger sister and ordered a wardrobe similar to her own trousseau.

FOR SOME reason Miss Barnard's engagement was broken and the trousseau never used. It was stored in an attic and not seen again until 1916 when the last of her family died and the home was broken up.

Not so the doll. She brought her share of happiness to the little sister and to

those who have played with her through the many years.

Besides her many dresses, including a duplicate of the wedding gown, the doll has all the accessories which went to make the well-dressed ladies of the Sixties.

There are hats, jackets, gloves, hoop skirts, a corset, bustle, parasol, fur set, jewels and many other things. She has a cupped head made of teakwood and trimmed with gold.

IN ADDITION to the little French doll, Mrs. Walter Carey of Middlebelt road, president of the Doll club, will have a display of her dolls.

The silver tea will be given from 2 to 4 p. m. at the community house. Proceeds will be used to purchase furnishings for the new Kappa Delta house at East Lansing.

Mrs. Randall chose brown erpe with brown and tan accessories. Her bouquet was of yellow roses.

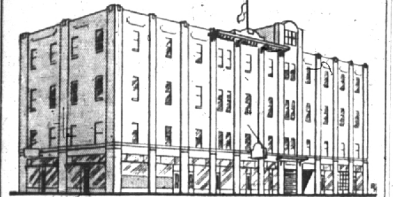
An informal reception was held at the home of the bride's parents after the ceremony.
