Few Miss Halloween Party In Birmingham

There is only one answer to any \$64 question one might ask about Halloween in Birmingham. There are very few persons you can ask about their plans who will not, in one way or another, be taking part in the community party.

The population of Birmingham is over 19,000. Last Oct. 31 some 12,000 persons watched 4,500 youngsters march, while another group of a hundred or so prepared food, judged contestants, handed out prizes and supervised the several programs. Added up, those figures take care of just about everybody in town.

If you are of school age, you are right in the middle of it all. Right now you are probably planning your costume for the big affair—the parade if you're going to march, or the dress you will wear to the dance after the parade.

YOU WILL probably see yourself receiving one of the more than 400 prizes which will be awarded. You know they will be fun, a sandwich, doughnut and cider, even if you don't win a prize.

If you are a mother, you are one of several thousand wardrobe

mistresses racking your brains or what to design or buy for your Pride and Joy, which will guarantee him or her one of those prizes. You may be all set, or you may be casting anxious looks at the date and wishing you'd started earlier. Whatever the case, you are very conscious of Halloween in your town.

If you are a father and belong to the PTA or a service club, your job is cut out for you by the organization. After you help mother get the kids to the starting point, you hurry off to the food lines to act as chef or waiter. Or you may be dashing off to the Wabeek building to act as guardian along the line of march.

YOUR JOB WILL be to keep the crowds back so the children will have plenty of room and the judges can see each one. You'll be setting a pretty good example there.

because you can stand in the street and get a really good look at your boy or girl as the marchers go by.

If you are a local businessman you have already done your part when parade night comes. You may look with satisfaction at the numbers hanging around your necks, because you know each one of those cards means a prize—and you helped provide them.

If you happen to be a realtor, and a member of the Real Estate Board, you will listen with joy as the kids talk about the refreshments they are heading for. You know you are partly responsible for them, because your group has contributed largely to it.

BUT, DOCTOR, lawyer, architect, car dealer, or what have you, you know you have had a hand in making this a happy night for the kids. Your merchandise or your dollars have gone into it, and the laughter of the kids around you is more than enough to repay you for what you have done.

If you are a member of the teaching staff in the Birmingham district you also have your job. It will be from you that the youngsters receive their tickets and instructions as to how to proceed with the party. You will tell them where the lines will form, what groups they will join for entertainment and food and what the hours are.

You will caution each child that the parade will start at 7:30, but that they should be there before that time, to be lined with the others and be eligible for prizes.

IF YOU ARE a member of the committee which has planned the affair, you will be praying for nice weather—not too cold, not too hot and of course—dry.

You will try to be sure no small detail has slipped by unnoticed. You will want to know that every child, every ticket, every judge—yes, every hot dog and bun, is in the proper place at the proper time.

As you watch the youngsters milling about before the parade, as you watch the marchers, as you watch the food lines and as you check up on the various entertainments, your mind will be leaping

into the next party. You will spot, and mentally note, many little changes which can be made to make next year's affair an even better one.

If you are "just folks" you will be planning your evening to get to the uptown district and watch the party from the sidelines. You will be arranging your plans for the evening so you will be free for the short time needed to supply the audience for the Biggest Thing in Town.
