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### Gas Most Popular Cooking Fuel Here

Who's cookin' with what? In Birmingham most folks are cookin' with gas. A U. S. Department of Labor survey discloses, in fact, 81.9 per cent of the people of the area use gas for food preparation. In contrast only 18.1 per cent use electricity and .9 per cent other fuels for firing their cooking utensils.

The survey reported that of all Birmingham area residents who have occupied new homes or converted their houses to new cooking systems since 1945, 68.9 per cent have selected gas as their cooking fuel.

ASSURANCE THAT an adequate supply of their preferred fuel is and will be available was made by the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association.

"Natural gas producers throughout the nation reported a reserve of 15.6 trillion cubic feet as of the first of this year," H. Leigh Whitlaw, managing director of GAMA, said in commenting on the survey.

Based on recent annual increases, it is logical to assume that this reserve supply may increase to 200 trillion cubic feet by the end of this year.

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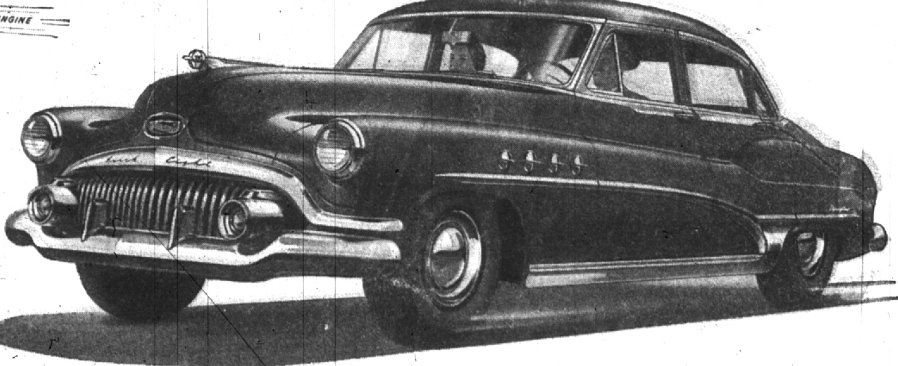
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
