

Scottish Hockey Team At Kingswood Saturday

The Scottish Women's hockey team now touring the United States will play the Great Lakes squad at Kingswood School Cranbrook hockey field Saturday, Oct. 27 at 10:45 a.m.

The squad is making its first appearance in this country since 1931.

THE 15 SCOTTISH players arrived in America Sept. 29 and the first of their 19 matches was with the Long Island field hockey team at Hofstra college, Hempstead, N. Y. The match at Kingswood follows the contest with Earlham College at Richmond, Ind. Tuesday and the team will be on tour until after Thanksgiving.

It is scheduled to play daily matches at the National Field Hockey tournament, Nov. 22, 23, 24 and 25 at Wellesley College, after which it will return to Scotland. Nine of the Scots who will play here were of their country's touring team which went to South Africa last summer. Miss Jean Torrance, forward, is captain.

The visitors are being entertained during their Michigan stay by the Detroit Field hockey association. Following the game Saturday, they will be guests at a buffet luncheon at Kingswood school.
