Nation-Wide Hunt Reveals No Clues To Local Fugitive

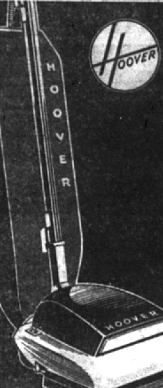

CHILI para BANONIS
(An All-American Favorite)

1/2 lb. bacon, sliced
1 large onion, chopped
1 large green pepper, chopped
1 lb. ground beef
1/2 tsp. chili powder

1 tsp. salt
cayenne pepper
1/2 N. 2 can tomato paste
1 1/2-cup can tomato juice
1 lb. can red kidney beans

Put bacon in deep well cooker. Turn switch to high heat and fry bacon until grease covers bottom of cooker. Add onion and fry bacon until onion turns yellow. Add ground beef and green pepper, cook until onion turns yellow. Next add green pepper, salt and cayenne pepper (to taste). Stir thoroughly. Add tomato juice and tomato paste. Cover. When steaming, turn switch to low heat and cook twenty minutes. Then add kidney beans and cook ten minutes longer. Serve with...
