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To Promote More Lights

Police have been given the go-ahead by city commissioners to increase the number of street lights in Birmingham to promote safety.

Commissioners said they felt adequate lighting cut traffic accidents and was a good crime deterrent.

City Manager D. C. Egbert said police would request light installations where required for safety.

He said residents desiring lights must present petitions signed by 50 per cent of the people affected.

In the event a shield is requested for a light the same ruling will apply.

Commissioner Frank Rising said he would like to see police come in with many more light requests.

"There are lots of places on our Birmingham streets that are too dark and invite various kinds of trouble," he said.

Missing Portions of Chesterfield Sidewalk Ordered Constructed

City commissioners said Monday evening they would like to see all missing portions of sidewalk on the west side of Chesterfield between Maple and Oak constructed this fall.

Notices were ordered sent to all property owners to put in walks and correct extremely muddy conditions, especially in the south end.

Highway Dept. Plans Cross-Over Near 14 Mile Rd.

Birmingham's commissioners expressed approval Monday of a proposed U-turn channel on Woodward avenue, immediately north of 14 Mile Rd.

A state highway department survey showed extreme traffic concentration at this point, due mainly to southbound vehicles turning left to enter the northbound lanes.

The highway department suggested immediate construction of this cut through, and have added to the city of their plans.

Commissioners, endorsing the plan, already have asked the state for a similar turn just south of the Hunter-Oakland intersection, to make Hamilton more easily available to motorists.
