

Junior League Outlines Program

Recently the Birmingham Community House was the scene of interviews, held by the Birmingham Unit of the Detroit Junior League, for the placement of volunteers. 125 volunteers enrolled to work 12,500 hours during the coming year, averaging about 100 hours per person. The League also took this opportunity to outline and make better known their program of community service.

Memberships in the Junior League has a three-fold connection, education, participation, and obligation to the community. For this it was established, and the underlying purpose remains the fostering of interest among members in the social, economic, educational, cultural and civic conditions of the community; and to make their volunteer service more efficient. It is stressed that continued and specified volunteer service is a primary requirement for continued membership.

Through serving as volunteers, members are given an opportunity to learn more about their city or town, how it is administered, and the needs of its hospitals, schools and social agencies. The aim of the League is to constitute a training school which enables young women to take their places as members of civic and social agencies, and as well-equipped community leaders.

THE BIRMINGHAM UNIT sponsors activities: the Bargain Box, on Maple road, where new and second-hand articles are sold at low prices; the Saint Joseph Hospital Cart in Pontiac, where useful articles are sold to patients; the Arts and Interests group, which makes trays favors for Children's Hospital, the Junior League Shop in Detroit, which is an outlet for handwork of the League of the Handicapped; and the Senior Workshop in the Birmingham Community House where members work with older people in ceramics, weaving, or knitting. They also maintain the Children's Theater which entertains underprivileged children.

The League plans to provide volunteers for the Baldwin Public Library, Birmingham Community House, Campfire Girls of Southern Oakland County, Cranbrook Institute of Science, and the Family Service of Oakland County. They will also participate in the functions of the Michigan Children's Aid Society, the Oakland County chapter of the American Red Cross, and the Oakland County Children's Home.

Members are also active in the League of Women Voters, Parent-Teachers Associations, the Girl and Boy Scouts, and church activities.
