Frank J. Campbell, Ad Firm Founder Killed by Boulder

Frank J. Campbell, 72, of Waterford and Florida, member of the Campbell-Kowal advertising agency, was killed Sunday while working for agents in Oregon.

Mr. Campbell was crushed when a boulder, thought to weigh more than a ton, rolled on him.

A native of Royal Oak, he attended the Birmingham high school, leaving in his junior year to volunteer with the United States Volunteer company for duty in the Spanish American war.

He joined Henry T. Fernald in the formation of the agency in 1911 and served as its president until he retired from the advertising field in 1917. Prior to that he had been advertising manager for the First National bank in Detroit and the S. S. Kresge company.

DURING WORLD War I he served overseas with the AUSA and in World War II worked with the Oakland county rationing board.

He was a member of the Detroit Athletic club, Paicestine Lodge, 337 F. & A. M., King Cyrus chapter, P.A.M., Detroit Commandery 1, K.T. and Moslem temple.

Mr. Campbell is survived by a brother, Leo Campbell of Royal Oak; two daughters, Mrs. Lawrence Goodspeed of Detroit and Mrs. Florence Purno, St. Petersburg, Fla., and five grand children.

Funeral arrangements are incomplete.
