Invitational Tennis Tourney Concluded

Final matches in the Birmingham Tennis club's Annual Invitational tennis tournament Sunday concluded the fifth successful season in which the club has used the courts of Kingswood School, Crabbrook.

Tournament began Saturday, Sept. 8, with 36 entries in men's singles; 16 in women's singles; 16 teams in men's doubles; and nine teams of mixed doubles.

CONTESTANTS INCLUDED many top ranking players who have played in the principal tournaments in Michigan, Ohio and other midwestern states.

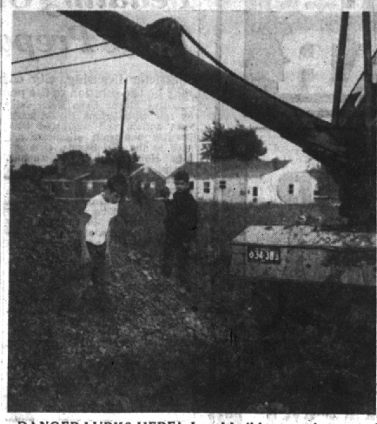
Elaine Lewicki, fourth ranking Junior Girl player in the United States was the only winner to repeat her last year's victory. In Sunday's finals, Miss Lewicki defeated June Stack, also of Hamtramck, 6-3, 4-4.

Both semifinal matches in the women's event Saturday were thrillers. Miss Lewicki defeated Mrs. Carol Dixon of Ann Arbor in three sets, 7-5, 2-6, 7-5. Mrs. Dixon was leading five games to four in the first set and had set point three times only to have the champion come from behind to win 7-5. Miss Stack dropped the first set of her semi-finals to Mrs. Hazel Brown 4-9 and then won the next two 6-3, 2-2.

Men's singles went to Robert Dixon of Ann Arbor, a newcomer to the Birmingham tournament. He defeated Al Hetzcek, captain of this year's University of Michigan tennis team, 6-2, 6-3. In the semi-finals Saturday, Dixon won from Fred Otto, 6-0, 6-2. Otto topped the Birmingham Invitational two years ago and was runner-up to Don Mackay last year.

HETZCEK DEFEATED Dick Potter of Hamtramck in the other semi-final match 8-6, 6-2. In the quarter-finals, Potter won from Mackay, defending men's champion by 7-5, 6-3 set scores.

The men's doubles event went to Bob Dixon and William Mikulich of Ann Arbor. They defeated last year's championship team of Mackay and Otto 6-4, 6-4. In the semi-finals, Dixon and Mikulich



won from Pritula and Trifanoff, 6-2, 8-6; while Otto and Mackay defeated Preston and Sieraki 7-1, 6-4.

Mary and Rudy Hernandez took the mixed doubles, by defeating last year's champions Lewicki and Hetzcek in three sets 6-3, 4-6, 6-4. The Hernandezs have won this event this year in both the Detroit City Championships and the Detroit Public Parks.

Annual dinner and election of officers of the Birmingham Tennis Club officers this year have been Ray C. Sackett, president; Chas. N. Blunt, vice-president; E. L. Dingler, treasurer and Mrs. F. C. Smith, secretary.
