## Mich. Girls-town Is Federation Aim

"Realizing that there is a great opportunity for salvaging the lives of a large number of teen-age girls who, through little fault of their own are being lost to society, the Michigan State Federation of Women's Clubs has announced plans for the development and operation of a Girls-town in Michigan."

With these words Mrs. Treas. Way Merrill, of Bloomfield Hills, state president, announces the largest project the group has ever undertaken.

Details for a Michigan Girls-town have not yet been completed, she said, and the first step is the acquisition of a large tract of land somewhat similar to Interlochen. She said a land grant must be sought from the state or through private foundations or agencies.

"WHATEVER the outcome of our survey, which has shown a great need for such an institution, it will not be operated as a lock-step, soulless institution. We want to prevent the girls from being exposed to national correction. We will not deal with rehabilitation exclusively but will emphasize preventiveness as much as possible. We will attempt to guide undisciplined or erring girls who are headed for reform schools, back to the path which leads to decency and a normal, useful life. Moral education and character building will be given special emphasis at Girls-town."

MRS. MERRILL said the Federation was considering several sites. The one selected will be accessible to rail and motor transportation. Mrs. Grace Olsen Kistler, of Grand Haven, first vice-president and chairman of the fund drive, said officers estimated \$250,000 will be needed each year until Girls-town is a going concern.

She is organizing meetings in the 18 Congressional districts in preparation for an extensive fund drive. Details of the project are being outlined to the 30,000 members during the first fall meetings this month and next.

The project, Mrs. Merrill said, has the wholehearted endorsement of persons and agencies who are directly concerned with the welfare of our young people.

AMONG THOSE who have expressed their interest in it are Mrs. Ruth G. Miller, chief parole officer for women in Michigan. She pointed out that delinquency patterns in girls and women with whom she has had contact nearly always is long-established before they face arrest.

Anyone who seeks to reduce the juvenile delinquency rate should think in terms of prevention rather than correction in some penal institution," she said.

In the same field, Elizabeth Grindley of the Detroit police department's young bureau said she is properly organized and operated center for girls was a definite need. She added that broken homes alone, through neglect and over into positions they are not able to cope with.

Mrs. Cain pointed out that among the many functions of the League is that of outstanding service to the citizenry. She declared, "In the candidate rally and questionnaire, both the voter and the candidate are benefited by the major work of the members of the local League. The LWV is a true democracy."

With a national membership of 1,000,000, the League of Women Voters has been recognized as an outstanding influence in the national and state governments. The Congressional Library has recently requested the records of the National League in Washington, D. C. and they are now in the process of being filed there. It is the first time the records of such an organization have been requested by the Library.

Next meetings of the Birmingham League will begin in October. Dates will be announced later.
