Fence Ordinance Considered by Southfield Board To Halt Thefts

"Although in Birmingham there have been 30 burglaries as compared to 34 last year, this type of crime is on the increase in the area," Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said this week.

In making the statement, Moxley asked the help of residents by reporting suspicious cars or persons.

"We cannot over emphasize the importance of people calling us immediately," he said. "Often the department can prevent a crime or apprehend the persons involved immediately."

"WE WOULD RATHER answer any number of false alarms than miss one which was an actual crime."

"In addition, there are certain things you can do to safeguard your home. When you go out in the evening, leave a light on, the shades up and secure all doors. Notify neighbors when you leave and when you expect to return and ask them to call us if they see anything suspicious."

"Here I might warn residents to call the police and leave the rest up to them. It may cost you your life to investigate on your own."

"IF YOU SEE A suspicious car and can safely do so, get the license number and report it to the department. Do nothing else. Your watching or investigating may drive the occupants away before the police arrive."

As an additional precaution, Moxley warned householders about leaving money and jewelry in sight. These, with guns, small radios and cameras are among the favored items of burglars.

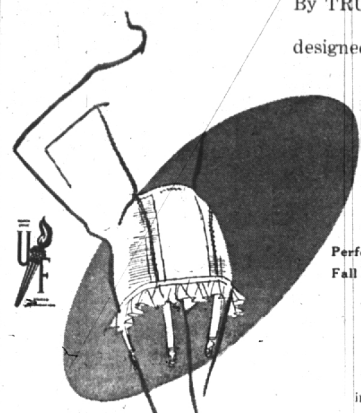
"When you see something disturbed upon returning home, call the police at once and touch nothing until we arrive," he concluded.
