Community House To Have Oil Heat

Work was started last week on the installation of two new oil-fired furnaces for the Birmingham Community House, board members have been told. The work is in charge of Eric F. Hyde, engineer, and T. Hollister, Masley.

The present system of both hot air and steam heat will be continued but new units will be added where needed. The ventilation of the main auditorium will be renovated and improved. The work will be finished in a month, according to Charles Kiss House director.

A 2,000-gallon oil tank has already been installed. Mrs. Isley told the board that the kitchen had been completely remodeled. In addition to a new refrigerator, floor coverings, lights and painting has been done. The old pantry has been turned into a serving room and cupboards built.

Enrollment 3,165 in Southfield

Southfield township school records show a total enrollment of 3,145 pupils, according to Superintendent, Glenn Schoenhals. Grades kindergarten through eighth have a total of 2,764, an increase of 272 over last year's figures of 2,492 pupils. By the new high school building, which is accommodating the eighth, ninth and tenth grades, there are 654 pupils.

THE TOWNSHIP'S GROWTH can be illustrated by the fact that last year, Southfield township schools had a total enrollment of 2,670 pupils. However, these figures didn't include the tenth grade.

The superintendent said that because of overcrowded classrooms, half day sessions in the first grade will be conducted in most schools.

Schoenhals stated, "We foresee some relief when more of the high school rooms are completed. At that time, seventh graders will go to the new high school and there will be additional rooms for the first grade classes."

new non-resident pupils because of the crowded conditions. In other business, all cafeteria workers were given a 10% salary increase. Lack of a gymnasium-auditorium for the new high school also was discussed by board members. A study of school census and township population trends was requested and a meeting will be called in the near future to discuss the matter. Schoenhals said that no auditorium-gymnasium was constructed because of insufficient funds. He pointed out that building costs have increased 30% since 1945. At that time it was hoped to have these facilities.

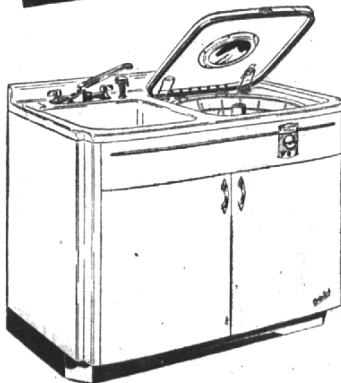
