Turk Engineers Take Time Off To Visit Locally

Ten young engineers from the Republic of Turkey, here for a six-months' study of Michigan Bell Telephone Company operations, were Sunday dinner guests of Mr. and Mrs. Armand L. Issette, 16252 Elizabeth, Beverly Hills.

Mr. Issette, a senior engineer for Michigan Bell, said the group is here to inspect an American home—and they made the most of it.

Nothing escaped the up-to-date ranch-type home and observed all the modern conveniences that the average American demands in his home, but which would be luxuries in most Turkish homes.

The Turkish engineers are all graduates of the Technical University at Istanbul and all hold reserve commissions in the Turkish Army.

They are here to take the second step in a three-point program which was initiated last April when seven Bell System engineers accepted a one-year commission from the Turkish government to go to Turkey to assist in reorganizing that country's telephone system.

"THE THIRD and final phase of the operation will take place when the men return home to coordinate their efforts with those of the Bell System engineers."

Adnan Baybora, head of the delegation visiting here, said he felt that the group had accomplished a great deal since they arrived early in August.

"We are very grateful to all of the fine people we have met here in Michigan," Baybora said, "for making us feel so much at home."

"We are learning a lot about the operation of your telephone system," he continued, "and I am certain that it will help us a great deal in improving our own telephone system when we return to Turkey."

Besides Baybora, the group includes Huseyin Cavallar, Cemal Sacim, Hayrettin Hayrettin Pakel, Omer Sevalik, Rifat Toplu, Turhan Zirh, Vehbi Basar, and Nusret Ertil.

Decide Procedure For Sale of Lot

The city has forwarded to the state highway department a request to have this U-turn channel installed.

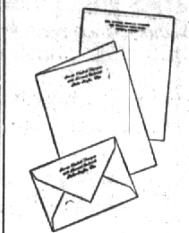
