**AAUW Announces Speakers For New Season**

This year's program, which includes a number of prominent individuals as speakers, has just been announced by the Birmingham branch of the American Association of University Women. In presenting the series, Mrs. Edward W. McCaul, program chairman, emphasized that the program covers AAUW's particular areas of interest; international relations, legislation, education, status of women, social studies, arts, book study, and fellowships for higher education for women.

First speaker of the season will be Dr. Deborah Bacon, Dean of Women at the University of Michigan, who will talk on "Opportunities for Women Today" at luncheon to be held at the Community House at 12:30, Wednesday, October 10.

On October 29 the speaker at a Guest Breakfast will be Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, Minister on the National Radio Pulpit. Dr. Sockman, who has just returned from abroad, will speak on "Education as I Saw It This Summer." The breakfast will take place at 9:30 at the Community House.

In November the Guest Night Program will feature Senator Homer Ferguson, Senior Senator from Michigan, who will talk on Washington. The date for this evening is to be announced later.

The regular luncheon on December 12 will be followed by a program given by the Book Study Group. Brief reviews of books for Christmas gifts will be presented.

Dr. T. C. Holy, Director of the Bureau of Educational Research of Ohio State University, will be the speaker at the luncheon on January 9. His topic will be "Educational Trends as Reflected in a Guest Breakfast will be Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, Minister on the National Radio Pulpit.
