Dr. Riggs worked through the various invasions of the Nazis and Communists and had the task of rehabilitating his school after the Civil War destruction. Before coming to this country, he visited Turkey, Syria, Israel and Egypt.

Three top winners in the Birmingham Rotary club's recent "Youth for Understanding" contest told club members how they developed their winning entries.

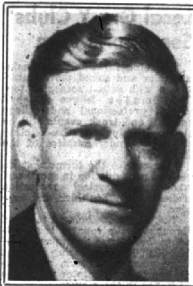
All Baldwin high school students, the winners were Sandra Puls, first; Nancy Johnson, second; and Mary Mullin, third.

Royal Oak Library Offers Classes for Foreign Born

Birmingham area foreign born residents can enroll in classes in English and citizenship at the Royal Oak Public Library, 302 South Main, Royal Oak.

Both classes which started this week, are free and run for a period of 10 weeks. Citizenship class will be offered Wednesdays from 7 to 9 p.m. in the library auditorium, and English courses, Thursday's from 7 to 9 in the same location.

Classes are sponsored jointly by the library and the Royal Oak Adult education department.

Adult Education Courses Offered in Royal Oak

Registration is underway this week for the adult education program of the Royal Oak public schools, according to Director Arthur A. Rezny.

Rezny pointed out that many Birmingham area residents have expressed interest in the program. Fall term is from Oct. 1 to Dec. 7.

Homemaking classes include fabric painting, knitting, sewing, tailoring, millinery, slipcover and

drapery making, interior decorating, flower arrangements and cake decorating.

VOCATIONAL CLASSES offered are auto shop, mechanical drawing, woodshop and machine shop.

In the arts and crafts division are art, ceramics, photography, Pennsylvania Dutch painting and China painting.

Included in general education courses will be personality and speech, radio production, creative dramatics and lip reading.

Business and retailing are beginning, advanced and intermediate shorthand and typing and family living will be courses in parenthood and a pre-school clinic.

Rezny stated that a series of six lectures titled "Our World Today" will be held Thursday evenings beginning Oct. 11. Speakers will be John F. Muelh, Prof. Edward E. Ward, James I. Crump, Prof. N. Marbury Finemco, Prof. Russell H. Field and Prof. Preston Slosser.

THESE TALKS will be held at Longfellow school auditorium. Cost is 50 cents a lecture or \$1.50 for the series.

Registration for the courses will be taken this week at the adult education office in the board of education building from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Royal Oak high school from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Royal Oak public library from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.
