**Rookie Cops Open Classes Here Oct. 3**

One of the four police training schools for the metropolitan Detroit area will open in Birmingham on Oct. 2. The complete training will consist of at least 30 hours, with 32 hours included in the first course.

The opening school is designed primarily for officers of less than one year's service. Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said about 160 officers in the area were expected to attend this school. He added that others were planned to offer

a complete new course of study each time. Three other groups will be held in this area including Lincoln Park, Grose Pointe Park and Highland Park, and officers may attend whichever is most convenient. The same instructors will be in charge of all classes.

"THESE MEN" Moxley said, "have been selected for their extensive training in police work. They will be from the FBI, Detroit police department, Michigan Liquor commission and the prosecutor's office."

The courses will include rules and regulations, public relation, note taking fundamentals of investigation, traffic direction, liquor law enforcement, patrol and observation, collection and preservation of evidence, family disturbance, jurisdiction of federal

agencies, report writing, misdemeanor arrests, court procedure, sex deviates, crime scene search and other related subjects. The school grew from a series of meetings held by the training committee of the Southeastern Association of Chiefs of Police in Michigan.
