only several routine traffic violations. Although there was one fatal accident in the county, from what I hear our record was typical of other nearby areas."

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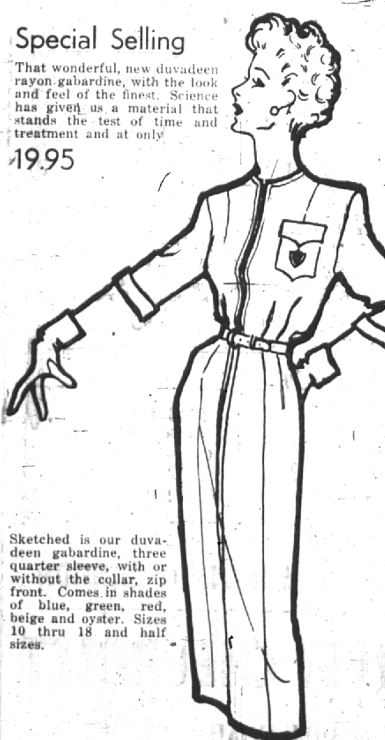
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Dean McAllister Weds Lorraine Boone
