the Pantlind Hotel and Civic auditorium, will be highlighted by lectures given by 28 eminent medical men from the United States.



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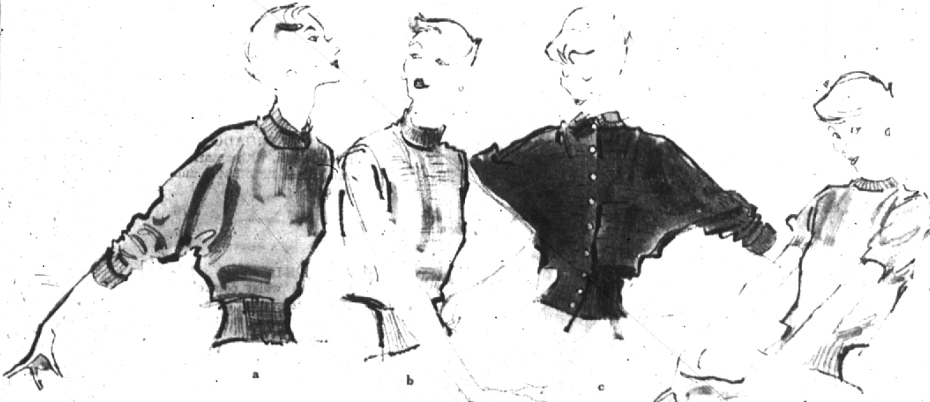
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
