in the fall and in the meantime try to educate the public on the advantages of having a new fire hall," Patterson explained.

Commissioner Ralph A. Main declared: "The new fire hall is absolutely necessary, but I feel the \$300,000 cost is somewhat high. If the cost was lower, I think it would go through."

He favored resubmission of the bond issue, but only after it had been restated to see if the amount could be lowered.

"RIGHT NOW I wouldn't want to say anything," stated Commissioner Lance C. Minor. "I believe the thing to do is let it simmer for a while and hope there are no serious fires in the meantime."

In a Tuesday morning statement, Fire Chief Vern W. Griffith said:

"While it is true the majority of the voters wanted additional fire protection, it lacked a small percentage to be effective, and a mandate has been given."

"Therefore, we, the members of the fire department, will do our best—as we have in the past—regardless of the lack of equipment and a place to house it, to maintain a consistent low fire loss in every section of the city, heedless of traffic and other conditions."

Griffith also praised The Birmingham Eccentric for its April 3 front page editorial which Griffith said presented "accurate and undistorted facts having to do with the physical fire defense of the city of Birmingham."
