Investigation of Liquor Applicants In Southfield

The question of more liquor licenses for Southfield township, juggled between the township board and the State Liquor Control Commission for the past month, came to a head Tuesday night at the board meeting when it was discovered that the township would have to take the initial step.

The board voted to investigate all of the 19 applicants seeking the six additional liquor licenses available in the township based on latest population figures.

The board has the power to accept or reject any of the applicants and can decide that the township will retain only the six licenses now in force.

TWO WEEKS AGO the board received a reply from the Liquor Control body asking that the board recommend six of the 19 applicants for new licenses.

The board, already faced with inquiries from interested property holders, asked the state to make the necessary surveys in affected neighborhoods and report on their findings.

The second reply from the commission stated that it was the township's responsibility to make initial recommendations preceding the survey.

Board Members Margaret C. Bradbury, Thomas Langan and Glenn C. Hagus were appointed to make the investigations by Supervisor William Roemer.

The investigations will include prospective license sites and the reputation of the people applying for the license.

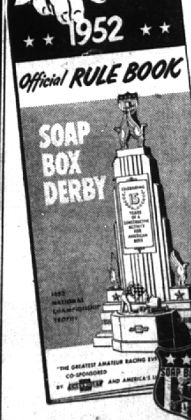
