Boris and Veronica Maximovich

April 16th Maximovich Concert

Next for Music Guild Series

Boris Maximovich, pianist, and Veronica Maximovich, mezzo-soprano, will be the featured artists in the next of the Cranbrook Music Guild concert series.

The concert at the Cranbrook Auditorium at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday, April 16. The evening's accompanist will be Jerome Winter. Boris Maximovich, European concert pianist, was born in the Russian Ukraine. A graduate of the Conservatory of Kiev where he was a student of Simon Barere, he became a professor there while embarking on his concert career.

When the Nazis invaded the Ukraine, Maximovich was taken into forced labor camp in Germany, where he was eventually freed by the American army. Refusing repatriation, he began concert tours for the American and French troops.

Afterwards Maximovich presented concerts in nearly all the major cities of Western Europe, including Paris, London, Munich, Hamburg, Geneva, Zurich, Amsterdam and others.

Through the Church World Service of the National Council of Churches, he and his family were brought to America.

VERONICA MAXIMOVICH is also a graduate of the Conservatory of Kiev and a former member of the Kiev Opera Company. Later she studied at the Vienna Music Academy and joined the Vienna Opera Company.

After spending part of World War II in an Austrian labor camp from which she was liberated by the American and French armies, she married Boris Maximovich in 1945. Later she took opera engagements in Western Germany and Austria.
