LEGAL NOTICES

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR STATE PARKS AND RECREATION

Pursuant to the authority vested in the Commissioner of State Parks and Recreation by Act No. 17, Public Act of 1951, as amended, the following rules and regulations are hereby made and adopted:

1. To ride horses, except on designated trails or under a permit to ride for field dog trials.
2. To enter an area used as a permit to ride for field dog trials.
3. To have a dog in or to allow a dog to enter an area used as a permit to ride for field dog trials.
4. To change clothing in public buildings or motor vehicles.
5. To operate a motor vehicle except on roads or designated parking areas.
6. To use loud speakers or public address systems without written permission issued by an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.
7. To use fire arms, or other weapons, or other dangerous weapons.
8. To use any other weapons.
