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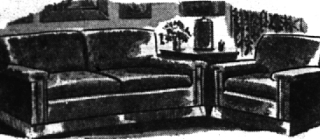

Southfield Fears Taxes For Budget

A total budget of \$270,867.71 for the 1952-53 fiscal year was approved by Southfield township voters Monday at the township's annual meeting.

Township officials state that some \$51,000 will have to be gained either through money from the county or by a spread of a one mill tax levy or a voted tax of the electorate.

The drain at large figure, first set at \$37,000, has been cut to \$27,400 on recent reports from the county.

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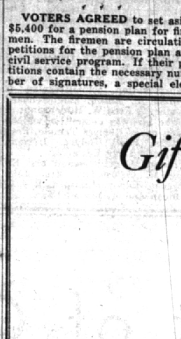
**Southfield Boy Killed In Road**

Winter told state police that the boy was riding home from his newspaper job and waved to him as he approached the driveway. The boy signaled that he was going to turn but the driver of the car, Carol W. Wilson, Dearborn, could not stop.

WILSON SAID that he cautioned his son about traffic when the boy's pet dog was killed in almost the same spot more than a month ago.

Wilson was not held by police.

Maged to Manage Glen Oaks Club

A number of changes have been made at Glen Oaks Country Club this season, including the appointment of Ted Maged who served the club last season as pro, to the position of manager.

Maged replaces Peter Gettings who has returned to his former post as manager of Beverly Hills Golf Club on Van Dyke. Charles McDonald will assist Maged.

Golfers at the 13 Mile rd. club again will be playing the course in its intended order after one season of switching the nines around, Maged said.

New asphalt walks have been installed around the club house.

ANOTHER MAJOR change is the location of the new pro shop, now located in the main corridor of the building. The dining room will serve double duty as grill room for golfers. A new bar and numerous tables have been installed. Many parties and golf outings have been booked for the season, according to Maged, who said the club will continue to hold such events.

The pro shop and grill room has been transformed into a lounge. The locker room has been completely renovated, while on the golf course tees have been sodded along with general conditioning procedure. It is planned to water the fairways more heavily this season.

Was There A Panther Here Five Years Ago?

Recent publicity concerning the black panther which has been reported in Oakland county, has brought back memories of five or six years ago to Miss E. M. Bigelow, 384 Pierce.

"I was living on North Woodward near the Hunter intersection," she recalled. "At the rear of the house toward the river was a yard with about 500 turkeys in it.

"For some time the birds were disturbed every night and made horrible noises as though badly frightened. I called the owner who posted a guard for several nights, but was unable to catch a glimpse of anything.

"ONE NIGHT after the guard had been removed, I happened to hear the birds again and looked out toward my yard. I could see some sort of a huge black animal there, which I'm sure wasn't a dog. I tried to attract its attention, but it fled to the woods for several nights, but was unable to catch a glimpse of anything.

"When the owner came the next morning he found a hole had been made in the wire and one of the turkeys was badly mauled. No trace of the animal was seen. Several other turkeys had been injured during a short period, too.

"THE STORIES of this panther, or whatever it is, brought this to my mind, and I felt it my duty to report this previous incident in my life. It will perhaps make people more alert and save someone's life."

Miss Bigelow said that the disturbing animal never was captured or killed.

Under the joint sponsorship of the Birmingham, Royal Oak and Ferndale, Christian Science Churches, Arthur Perrow of Chicago spoke at the Royal Oak theater April 11.
