

### Troy Budget In Line With 1951-52 Costs

The Troy township board Monday night approved a township budget of \$113,300 for the 1952-53 fiscal year.

The township has already approved the hiring of the four deputies who will patrol township roads at night.

A \$20,000 fund for street and road repair will include supplemental construction and repair of roads in cooperation with the Oakland County road department.

TOWNSHIP OFFICIALS have held the line on costs wherever possible and now find that anticipated revenues of \$113,000 balances with expected expenditures and will not ask for a tax spread from the county tax allocation board.

The anticipated revenues include \$78,000 in state sales tax returns, \$29,000 from intangibles taxes, \$8,000 in license and permit fees and \$800 from the township cemetery.

At the annual meeting held Monday, April 7, voters present asked that a larger reserve be set aside this year for the proposed purchase of a fire truck replacement sometime next year.

The board approved the sum of \$11,900 to be placed against the purchase of the truck that will be housed at the Big Beaver station.

### Nearly 200 Tots Have Eyes Tested By Junior League

Nearly 200 pre-school children were given vision tests during the first month of the vision screening project sponsored by the Birmingham Junior League group, according to Mrs. R. Jamison Williams.

Mrs. Williams pointed out that the group would remain at the Community House through May and that no appointment or fee is asked. Screening is being done in the Runch Room each Tuesday, Thursday and Friday morning from 9 a.m. to noon.

"Miss Helen Weaver, who organized our activities here, returned from New York for an inspection of our work," Mrs. Williams said, "and complimented the girls highly on what they are doing."

"THE DOCTORS to whom we have referred children who showed signs of vision defects have also been free in praising the program. They have told us that none of our referrals have been premature and that each child was very much in need of vision correction."

Of the groups screened during April, only 16 per cent were found to have defective vision, Mrs. Williams reported.

"I feel that we could possibly have had many more children if it had not been for the bad weather, a great amount of illness among children and the fact that so many families were on southern vacations," she said. "I do feel—and hope—that the number will increase during the next several months of the program."

Children who show signs of unusual vision at the screening center are given the block 'E' with which the tests are conducted so they may become familiar with the program at home and return for a second check, she explained.

Unless such sidewalk is constructed by the owner or his agent, if you, as owner, elect to construct such sidewalk, written notice of such intention must be filed with the City Clerk not later than Wednesday, April 16, 1952. Such construction shall be at the expense of the property owner and in conformity with the specifications in the Engineering Department of the City of Birmingham. Permits shall be secured prior to construction of the walk.

In the event that the property owner does not elect, prior to April 30, 1952, to construct the aforementioned sidewalk, the City shall proceed with such construction and estimate the cost of the same against the property owner.

City construction costs are estimated to be:

- Construction of new sidewalk where no walk exists—Approximately 60¢ per square foot
- Construction of 4 in. replacement of existing walk—Approximately 40¢ per square foot
- Construction of 6 in. walk in alleyways, replacing existing walk—Approximately 60¢ per square foot

### Approve Purchase Of Nine Machines For Troy Voters

Troy township has joined an ever-lengthening list of Oakland County municipalities and townships who are switching to voting machines.

The board Monday night approved the purchase of nine machines at a cost of \$11,160 from the Automatic Voting Machine company. It was decided to buy the machines outright.

THE BIG BEAVER precinct, largest in the township, will be served by three machines. Precinct 1, township hall, will have two machines as will precinct 3, fire hall at 5910 Lincoln and precinct 4, the community building at 2375 East Maple.

Delivery of the machines is hoped for by June 1 so township officials can place one machine in the high school and one in the township hall for demonstration purposes.

### E. P. Crenshaw Describes Bus Lines' Expansions At High Twelve Meeting

E. P. Crenshaw of the General Motors Truck Company Coach divisions was the Monday dinner speaker for Birmingham's High Twelve club.

Crenshaw spoke of the spectacular growth of bus business throughout the country. He cited the Greyhound lines which in a comparatively short time have attained more route miles than any railroad in the United States.

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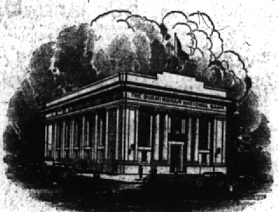
