The panel, with Prof. George R. Husband of Wayne university, will speak on "Questions in Connection with Overhead to be Applied to Inventory".

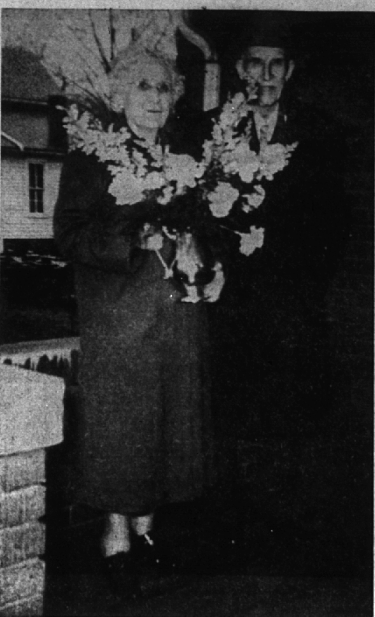
