

Hills Board Of Education Budget Submitted

The Bloomfield Hills board of education has submitted a total budget of \$230,810 for the coming fiscal year to the Oakland County tax allocation board.

The proposed budget calls for an increase of \$31,735 over last year's budget of \$199,075. Superintendent John Jacobs said there were noticeable increases in both the operational budget and the capital outlay. Institutional needs are figured at \$155,250 as compared to \$134,950 last year. Capital outlay was raised from \$10,000 last year to \$15,000 this year.

Jacobs said the millage rate would now be determined by the allocation board. The present millage is 7.96 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation.

Local Accident Victims Show Improvement

James Lougee, four-year-old son of Mrs. Arthur Lougee, 324 Greenwood, hurt April 9 when he ran in front of a car near his home, is reported as improving steadily. The child is in St. Joseph Mercy hospital receiving treatment for a fractured leg and skull concussion.

Whelster L. Douglas, 1551 Holland, received a skull injury April 16 when struck by a car while crossing Woodward avenue, returned from the hospital Tuesday.

Mrs. Douglas said Wednesday morning that she was considerably improved but that the full extent of his injuries had not yet been determined.

Plan Over-Night Stay At Y Camp

Gr-Y Clubs in Birmingham elementary schools leave Friday afternoon, May 9, for an overnight stay at Camp Ojibwa on Fish Lake.

A motorcade of parents and youngsters will leave Birmingham at 3:30 p.m. Following the evening meal, a campfire program will take place in the counselor's ring.

Saturday morning the group will engage in the annual treasure hunt, followed by swimming, boating, and canoeing. Members of the 'Y' are urged to get in their reservations early as only a limited number can be accommodated.

Dondoro Promises Data On Airport Construction

Birmingham city commissioners have been notified by Rep. George A. Dondoro that he is making the necessary contacts with CAA officials to determine the possibility of construction of a proposed Detroit City Airport. In the meantime, local commissioners have been notified that the Detroit City Airport Board has adopted a resolution to join Royal Oak in a protest against the construction of the airport at the proposed Dequindre-12 Mile site.

School Budget Up \$30,600 In Troy

An operational budget of \$467,531 has been approved by the Troy Township Board of Education and submitted to the Oakland County tax allocation board. The budget represents a \$30,600 increase over the past year's budget which was set at \$426,931. Superintendent Stuart Baker estimated that this year's costs would mean an eight mill per thousand dollar of assessed valuation rate to the taxpayer.

Last year's rate was 7.34 mills. Although some expenditures such as capital outlay have been lowered this year, the greatest amount of increase in the new year's figures is reflected in the increase in salaries for instructors and the addition of seven new teachers.

Baker thought that \$95,500 of the total sum would be raised by the tax levy. He added that accurate figures on millage rates could not be determined until the actual valuation of the township was established.

4H Club Members Aid County Road Clean-Up

Birmingham members of the Avondale 4H Horse Club helped in the community clean-up campaign on county roads last weekend. Headed by Mrs. Peter Morton and Mrs. Robert Dudley, the club worked with sportsmen's clubs and trucks donated by Mrs. Morton and Russell O'Neal to clean debris from community road ditches.

Bloomfield Hills B of E Approves Two New Courses

The Bloomfield Hills Board of Education Monday night approved the course of study for the next year's school season.

The board added a course in French for ninth graders, a world geography class for 11th and 12th graders and also a course in music appreciation for the 11th and 12th graders.

Superintendent John Jacobs was instructed to obtain a topographical survey of a 23-acre parcel of land at Long Lake road and Echo road for a possible future school site.

Birmingham Man Heads New Ford Department

Lawrence E. Nelson, 605 Pierce, has been appointed central branch manager for the Ford Motor development office, sales and advertising staff, according to Harley F. Riley, dealer development director.

In head of the newly established branch, Nelson will supervise dealer development activities in the central regions of both Ford and Lincoln-Mercury divisions.

A native of Michigan, Nelson joined Ford Motor in 1949, after two years in the maritime service during World War II, as some manager for the Detroit district. He was assigned to the dealer development staff a year ago.

Applicants Mailed Questionnaire For Liquor Licenses

Applicants for the six additional liquor licenses permitted Southfield township on the basis of new zoning laws will be required to fill out a questionnaire for the board, it was decided Tuesday night.

Board Member Glenn C. Hague submitted for board approval a form letter and sample questionnaire that would help the board decide which applicants were best suited for the licenses. There are 18 applications for the licenses on file in the township.

Supervisor William Roeser told the large audience that this action "does not mean that we will actually grant any more licenses in the township; but we feel that it is only fair to investigate the applicants."

Tickets for the Birmingham High school band concert, to be given May 8 at the Baldwin school auditorium, go on sale this week.

The ticket committee met Wednesday at the home of Chairman Mrs. Roger S. Thompson to discuss plans for the ticket drive. The committee is made up of mothers of the band members. Red Cross Quota Topped In B'ham Campaign

Sam Marshall, Jr., chairman of the current Red Cross drive in Birmingham, said Tuesday morning that receipts totaled approximately \$9,100. The city's quota was \$8,879.10.

Marshall said letters still were being received and that he expected the funds would continue to increase during the next few days, although the drive officially closed April 15.

Michigan Outdoors

Fish "Elevators" Operating Man-made obstructions to natural fish spawning activity in Michigan streams and rivers call for a helping hand for wall-eyes and rainbow trout at this time of year. At the Newwaygo Dam on the Muskegon, the Homestead Dam on the Bettsie and the Tippee Dam on the Manistee, the Conservation Department is supervising fish "elevator" projects.

Close to 12,000 big spawners mostly wall-eye pike—will be trapped or netted and then released above the dams to complete their spawning runs. Some will return to the Great Lakes thru the water flow at the dams, while many more will remain up-river to challenge the skill of Michigan anglers this summer.

12,000 Wall-eyes Netted Greatest activity along these lines is at the Newwaygo Dam on the Muskegon River. A heavy run of wall-eyed pike has been in progress there for the past two weeks. Winch-operated dip nets are located along the river bank just below the dam. Major runs occur at night, and, under close supervision of Conservation Department personnel, local citizens man the nets transferring the catch to live boxes. Next morning aerated tank trucks move the fish upstream above the dam, distributing them at various points along the river. All fish are weighed, sexed and counted, and the transfer continues until a total of 10,000 wall-eyed pike have been netted. The cost of the project is borne by the Consumers Power Company, owners of the Newwaygo Dam. The big spawners range up to ten pounds in weight, and all 10,000 fish in the quota will probably be taken in less than a two week span.

Beetles Lift Progressing At the Tippee Dam near Weston on the Manistee River, and the Homestead Dam on the Bettsie just below Benzonia, traps are built into the power structures to catch the big steelhead or lake-run rainbow trout. Between eight and nine hundred will be lifted at Homestead within the next two weeks, while as many as 1200 may enter the Tippee Dam trap for distribution in the upper waters of the Manistee and Pine Rivers.

There is a striking difference in the appearance of the steelhead on the Bettsie and on the Manistee. Fish taken at the Tippee Dam on the latter river bear the brilliant-band rainbow stripe from gill to tail, while the Bettsie "bows are bright silver with only a hint of the vermilion stripe.

April 12th Opening Disappointing Thousands of fishermen who greeted the April 12th steelhead season for the first time this year found high, roly waters and water temperature below 40 degrees. Most fish were taken from the Bettsie River near the dam, where, for some unknown reason, the run of trout was well advanced. Elsewhere fishing was fair to poor, with only small concentrations of spawners in the rivers.

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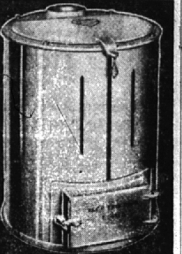
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
