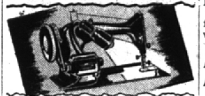
The contest was sponsored by the Birmingham branch and the posters will be displayed in local stores to arouse interest in civic beautification and practical gardening.

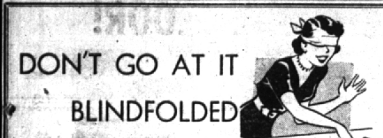

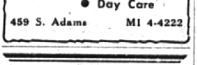

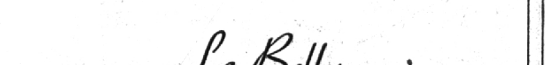
