### Garden Hints

Even though the weather is mild, it is too soon to clean out the mulch, thoughtful around choice perennials and roses.

A bamboo rake is ideal for cleaning up the lawn before adding fertilizer and grass seed. Modern efficient gardeners always carry up these remnants into bushel baskets to put on the compost heap for decomposed humus to be used next August.

To gain the desired end, add 1/2 cup of commercial decomposing medium, one shovelful of any soil (to promote bacterial action) and a galvanized bucket of water to one bushel of "straw".

The mixture becomes hot and kills weed seeds. Frequent stirring with a fork assures quicker results as oxygen aids decomposition.

Dogwood and Magnolias should be planted at once.
