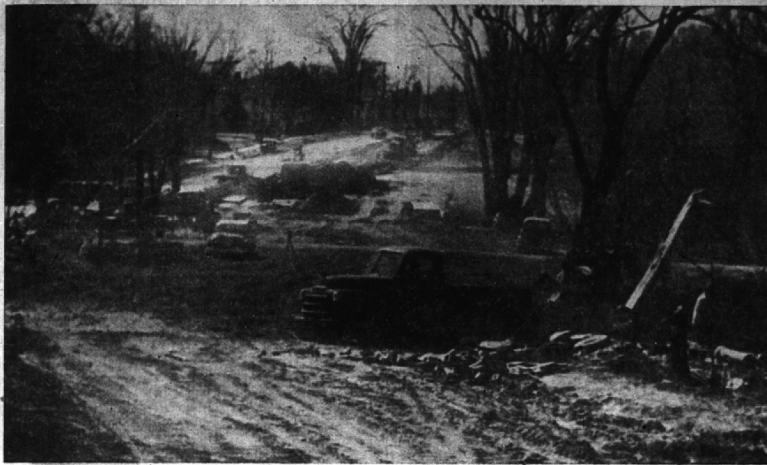

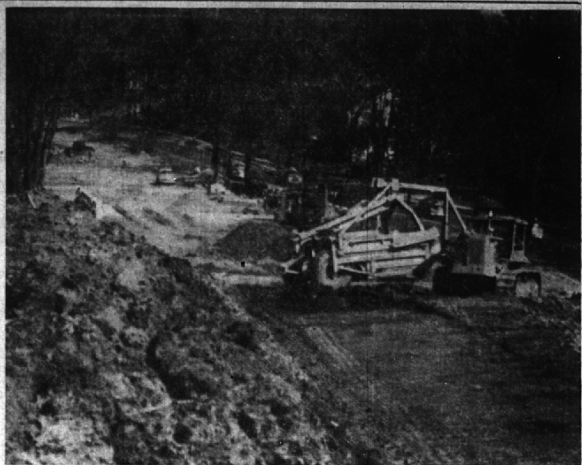

Your Fire Department

One man from approximately each fifteenth family in the area is enrolled as a volunteer. These men, in addition to training, working on the equipment and fighting Franklin area fires, are required to pay the annual protection dues of five dollars.

Along with a good many lesser projects, their winter work has provided a hose drying rack, an automatic siren cycling control, water connections in the fire hall, the overhaul of one pump and other fire truck equipment. Under way are a hose storage rack, a supply cabinet and ladder carrier for the tanker. Outdoor training and practices will be resumed soon. New signalling equipment at the

fire hall is the horn on the outside of the building which sounds when a call comes in on Mayfair 6-3221. Should this horn blow repeatedly, indicating that the phones elsewhere are not being answered, go to the phone inside the hall. Mark the location and nature of the fire on the map and blow the siren.

The volunteers responded to several calls last week including numerous grass fires and a minor house fire in Woodcreek Farms last Saturday evening. Rubbish and grass fire permits, required by state law, may be obtained from Bill Jones at the post office, from Les Fraser at his store or, on Sundays, from the

Franklin Service garage.
