The Cranbrook school varsity baseball team opened its season on March 27, with the third annual southern trip into Virginia and North Carolina, compiling a pre-season record of two wins against 4 losses. The Cranes opened the tour against Covington High School of Covington, North Carolina on Saturday, March 29. In a tight ten inning game, Cranbrook was edged 2-1 in spite of fine pitching from Bill Soter and a 4 for 4 day at bat from Don Slotkin.

Henderson High School was next for the touring nine and again they were edged by one run 4-3. Martin Goldman was tagged for the loss in a game which saw Cranbrook employ all four of its pitchers. This game was the first of five straight games to be played by the touring team on April 1. Cranbrook was swamped by Burlington High School, 16-1.

Wednesday, the Cranes won their first game in three years in the South, 7-3. The victim was Chapel Hill High School in Raleigh, North Carolina. Ferndale stopped the Cranbrook team and handed them their first loss of the season, 5-4, in spite of a tremendous home run by Hatch. Bill Soter was the victim of several costly errors and while giving up only two hits was tagged for the loss.

Saturday, April 19, Cranbrook rebounded with a 5-3 win over Assumption from Windsor. Overcoming a 3-0 deficit in the first two innings, the Cranes, sparked by Hatch with three hits, quickly grabbed the lead and with fine defensive play by Slotkin at third base and Hatch at shortstop held its advantage to win.

Cranbrook's next game is with Birmingham on Friday, April 25.

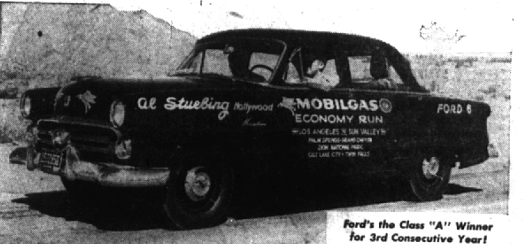
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
