**B'ham Customers Now Can Dial 11 More Communities**  
With the conversion of the Wyandotte exchange to dial operation early Sunday, one of the largest improvements undertaken by the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in recent months, Birmingham customers can now dial twice as many communities.  
By direct dialing, Birmingham customers can now reach a total of 35,000 more telephones with the addition of 11 communities to the local area.  
The eleven communities which were added to Birmingham's dialing area are: Clarkston, Commerce, Drayton Plains, Flat Rock, Lakota, Uxton, New Boston, Oxford, Rochester, Rockwood, Wall Lake and Wyandotte.

**AS A REMINDER** to users, Walter B. Fausser, manager here for company, pointed out that telephone numbers in each of the communities added now bear a central area prefix. In Wyandotte, for instance, telephone numbers are identified by two prefixes, "313" and "810". To reach telephones in the above communities, the prefix letter is dialed first, followed by the desired number.  
The prefix names for the other communities besides Wyandotte are: Clarkston (MAPLE), Commerce (EMPIRE), Drayton Plains (ORANGE), Flat Rock (STERLING).

The annual election will be held at 8 p.m. May 14, in the new YMCA building on West Lincoln.

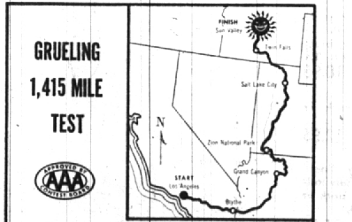
