

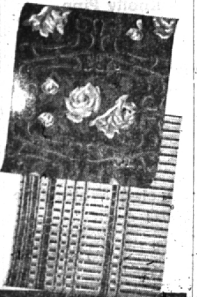

SOC Hospital Design Modern, Expandable

Many features have been incorporated in the planning of the new Oakland hospital, which are consistent with the latest trends in hospital construction and medical practice, according to Dr. Christopher G. Parnall, consultant for the hospital.

This article is the last in a series in which The Eccentric has published statements of prominent officials connected with this project.

Dr. Parnall explained that the hospital proper will be a four-story, cross-shaped building with accommodations for upwards of 200 medical, surgical and obstetrical patients.

PARNALL STATED, "Administration and essential service facilities will be located on the first floor. All the x-ray, laboratory, physical therapy, surgical, obstetrical and internal medicine facilities, in short all diagnostic and all therapeutic units, will be centralized on the second floor. On the floors above will be the accommodations for patients."

"He cited several benefits of this plan. They are: (1) The shape of the building is most important. By employing the cross shape, we achieve the greatest amount of sunlight and fresh air for all patients in whatever part of the hospital they may be. And the cross shape also permits vertical rather than horizontal transportation.

"This means that long corridors are eliminated and the centralized control which is focused at the points where the arms of the meet will allow the most efficient and economical use of professional and non-professional personnel."

"(2) NO ROOMS will contain more than two beds for patients. This will result in the greatest possible comfort for patients at a minimum cost and the cost of supplying this better service will compare favorably with large wards.

"Moreover, the smaller units will also permit the utmost flexibility in admitting and treating patients requiring various types of service."

"The centralization of diagnostic and therapeutic facilities on one floor is another feature which has been carefully planned. 'The interrelationships of the technical departments of a hospital have become closer and closer until, in today's practice of medicine, all departments work together at a coordinated team in the investigation and treatment of malfunctions of the human body."

"Therefore, by bringing these departments into physical juxtaposition in the hospital, we have taken another important step to ensure the comfort of patients and the most economical and efficient service."

"(4) AMPLE CONSIDERATION has been given also to the important role played by the community hospital as an emergency center. On the first floor, therefore, we plan a large emergency department with two well-equipped operating rooms and several nursing units to accommodate 10 patients while they require emergency treatment."

"(5) In planning Oakland hospital, we have recognized the fact that no important health center is static. As the service area grows and becomes more populous, pressure on the hospital increases proportionately.

"In generations to come, therefore, as the demand for hospital care continues to grow, entire floors of technical facilities and

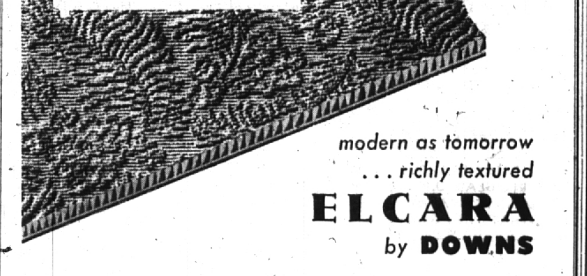
