Students Await Washington Trip

The 1952 Washington group will leave next Thursday with approximately 150 people boarding the Michigan Central train headed for eight days of fun and tours.

Under direction of E. A. Hubbard and a corps of seven group advisers, about 135 Birmingham students will visit Washington, New York, Yorktown, Jamestown and Williamsburg.

Leaving Detroit at 5:30 next Thursday afternoon, the group will arrive in Washington the following morning and tour the capitol, Washington monument, Supreme Court, Folger Shakespearean Library, Library of Congress, Pan American building, Jefferson memorial, and the Lincoln memorial.

SATURDAY THE GROUP will visit the Smithsonian institute, new National museum, and National gallery of art.

A trip to Mount Vernon, Washington Masonic memorial, and Arlington cemetery are on the agenda for Easter Sunday. Later in the evening the group will board the boat for Williamsburg.

The following day, Yorktown, Jamestown, and restored Williamsburg will be the main interest. At Williamsburg, the capitol, palace, jail, and powder magazine will be the main attraction. At Norfolk the group will again board the boat, this time to return to Washington.

FROM WASHINGTON THE group will go by rail to New York. In New York the group will have some free time. Members will have their choice between visiting Radio City and Rockefeller center or taking a three-hour boat trip around Manhattan island. Places visited will include LaGuardia airport, and the entire group will attend plays of their individual choice in the evening.

After the play everyone will board the train for Niagara Falls and home. After lunch at the General Brock hotel, the group will retrain for Detroit.

Besides sightseeing, other enjoyable activities are planned. These include a hotel party in Washington and two variety shows on the boat, under direction of Jack Goodman and Elizabeth Kurts.

STAGE PLAYS TO be seen in New York include "The King and I," "Call Me Madam," "Point of No Return," "I Am a Camera," "South Pacific," and "Two on the Aisle."

Martha Brown and Mary Christon are co-chairmen of the Easter outing service at which Senator and Mrs. Homer Ferguson will be guests of the bulletin "Capitol Bound" containing information on various points of the trip, traveling tips, and various comments on various members.
