LEGAL NOTICES  
RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR STATE PARKS AND RECREATION AREA

- It shall be unlawful:
  - To ride horses, except on designated horse trails or under a permit issued for field dog trials.
  - In State Parks and Recreation Areas, or portions thereof, not open to hunting, to (a) carry or have in possession a firearm unless authorized in both laws and regulations; (b) shoot an air rifle or air pistol; (c) discharge any firearm except in locations designated for that purpose.
  - To have a dog in or to allow a dog to enter a State Park or Recreation Area, or portions thereof, unless the dog shall be controlled on a leash of not more than 10 feet in length, except that field trials and hunting, or other field trials, are permitted on lands open to such uses.
  - To camp without a written permit issued by an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.
  - To operate a motor vehicle, except on roads or designated parking areas. To operate a motor vehicle on any park road at a speed exceeding 25 miles per hour, or at a speed greater than that posted, or to disregard any posted speed limit.
  - To use loud speakers or public address systems, or to use a written permit issued by an authorized representative of the Department of Conservation.
  - To create damage, or deface any tree or other vegetation.

These rules and regulations shall be in force and effect until May 1, 1941.

VIOLATION OF ANY RULE OR FAILURE TO PERFORM ANY ACT NOT FORBIDDEN BY THESE RULES IS PUNISHABLE BY A FINE OF NOT MORE THAN \$100 OR IMPRISONMENT IN THE COUNTY JAIL FOR NOT MORE THAN 30 DAYS, OR BOTH, AND IMPRISONMENT IN THE DISCRETION OF THE COURT.
