### Springdale Opens Season This Weekend

Springdale Park golf course will be opened this weekend, according to Bob Fauteck, manager of the city-owned, nine-hole course near the Northeast city limits. The course has come along fine this spring, Fauteck said, and is exceptionally dry for this time of the year. Greens are being cut and flags set out today.

New tees, built last summer, will be put into operation at once, but the new green on number two hole will be kept out of use for a few more weeks to allow the grass to get a better start. The course will play 180 yards longer this year due to the lengthening of the number two and three holes about 80 yards each.

FAUTECK pointed out that Birmingham residents can again buy a season membership that will allow the entire family to play golf for \$15.00. A single membership will cost \$10.00 and weekly fee is to remain at 50c per nine. On weekends and holidays the fee for each nine will be \$1.00, Fauteck said.

He also said rental clubs will be available and that the club house will be well stocked with golf equipment for sale.

Sandwiches and coffee will be available at Springdale in addition to the usual line of candy and soft drinks.

Prof. Hatt was born in Fredrickton, N. B., Canada, on Oct. 6, 1868.

He was graduated from the University of New Brunswick where he received an honorary doctor of philosophy degree and Cornell university, where he received two degrees in civil engineering and the Fourier gold medal.

He was on the staff at Purdue university from 1893 until his retirement in 1939. He also served as president of the American concrete institute and received their Turner gold medal. He was Indiana state engineer from 1921-39 and director of highway research for the National Research council, 1921-23.

Active in the engineering field here and abroad and was a designer of Boulder Dam. He had also written two books on engineering and numerous scientific papers.

Besides his daughter he is survived by two sons, Major Kendrick A. Hatt of Indianapolis and Dr. Robert Hatt of Cranbrook Institute, a sister, Mrs. Frank Sewell of Vancouver, B.C., and eight grandchildren.
