 A RESIDENT of Saginaw, Judge Picard was formulator and first chairman of the Michigan Liquor Commission, and also co-formulator and first chairman of the Michigan Unemployment Commission.  
 In 1939 he was appointed to fill the position as judge of the United States District Court, Eastern Division of Michigan.
