

New Teachers Will Be Seeking Living Quarters

Dr. Ireland stresses that "one of the most important problems in securing teachers is living quarters. Many new teachers will come to Birmingham in the latter part of August to seek rooms and apartments for the school year which begins on the day following Labor Day."

In requesting cooperation from citizens in the school district, Ireland points out that the happiness and comfort of the teacher at home makes a marked contribution toward their effectiveness with the children.

Handicapped by the absence of three top ranking players, Birmingham Tennis Club had to settle for a seven to four loss at the hands of the Windsor Tennis Club on the BTC courts at Kingswood School, Cranbrook, Sunday.

The Canadians brought over the strongest team they have fielded in the six years of Inter-club matches in Birmingham.

Matches were long and hard fought. Play started at 2 p.m. and did not finish until 7 p.m. In the men's singles Birmingham Tennis Club's two year champion, Dick Gabori, won from Windsor's number one player, Jim Dent, in three grueling sets, the scores going 6-4; 2-6; 6-2.

Windsor captured the other two men's singles matches, Jim Zeron beating Weston Meyers 6-2; 6-3, while the Canadian Club's clever Japanese player, Wally Yamashita, won from John Mackowski, 6-4; 7-5.

THE LADIES FROM ACROSS the border were too good for the Birmingham girls, winning all three matches. Isabelle Diebel won from Jane McKee 6-2; 2-6; 6-1.

Gloria Rahos won from Mary Lou Gregory 6-2; 6-4. Mary Fekete triumphed over Harriet Gabori in a marathon of 12-10 and 6-4.

Birmingham's sharp shooting junior, Gary Wright, defeated Windsor's Junior, Ed Woods, by identical set scores of 6-2; 6-2. Windsor took two of the three Men's Doubles matches, Birmingham's lone win going to Jack Patterson and John Smith who defeated Frank Awood and Lew Veres 6-4; 6-2. In the two Windsor wins Dent and Zeron, Roberts, Jack Watson and Harold Roberts in three tough sets, 6-2; 5-7; 7-5, while Jack Pollard and Yamashita took the measure of Chas. Blunt and Leon Bramley of Birmingham 6-4; 6-4.

In the lone Mixed Doubles match Isabelle Diebel and Ed Woods of Windsor won from Toni Di Marco and Gary Wright 2-6; 6-3; 6-2.

THE DRAW HAS BEEN MADE for the annual Birmingham Tennis Club championships which will begin this Sunday, Aug. 16, on the courts at Kingswood. Dick Gabori will be defending the Averill Trophy which he has held for two years. He will run into unusually tough competition this year from Jim Tobin, University of Michigan star of twelve years ago and Peter Stewart who was a star player in Kansas City before mov-

ing to Birmingham a year ago. It is uncertain whether (Mrs.) Katherine Smith will defend the Otto Kilbrand Trophy which she has held successfully for three years. Thus both of these trophies emblematic of the Men's and Women's singles championships in the BTC may find new homes.

No Property Destroyed In City's 39 July Fires

In spite of 39 alarms, including one general, answered by the Birmingham fire department last month, property damages were too small to be recorded. The report of Chief V. W. Griffith reads "\$0.00."
