Having disposed of that pressing question, she went on to say hats will be higher-crowned, and the simple wovencotton costume worn with dark suede gloves dominated the summer styles.

She particularly noticed the quality of European handwork, and their fine appreciation of detail as evidenced in their treatment of gloves and handbags.

Continuing with her trip, Miss Cooley remarked on the eeriness of the midnight sun in the Scandinavian countries, and majestic scenery along the fjords.

She ended her trip in New York August 3.

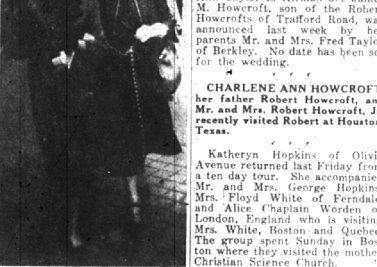
