### School Districts Share Sales Tax

The school districts of Birmingham and Bloomfield and the townships of Southfield, Troy, Bloomfield and West Bloomfield will share \$99,926.64 out of a total of \$718,675.94 from the sales tax diversion fund for school for the second quarter of this year.

Birmingham's share will be \$38,841.62 for the 5,737 students in the school district. Bloomfield, fractional number two will gain \$4,841.82 for its 727 pupils, fractional number three will receive \$979 for 147 students.

The 4,391 students in Southfield will account for \$29,244.06. Troy fractional number one with 2,446 pupils will receive \$16,380.36, and West Bloomfield's share will be \$10,299.76 for 1,538 students.
