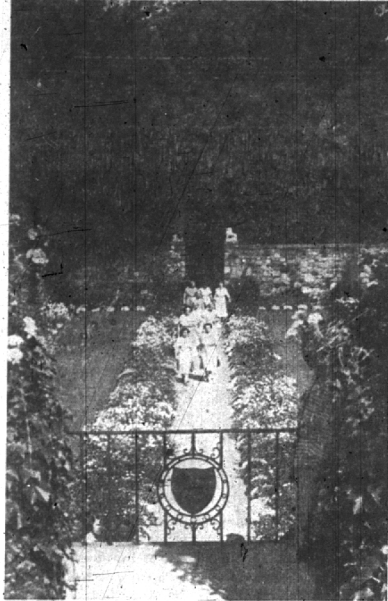
MRS. BICKNELL attended her daughter's nuptials in a silk shantung suit of Dior blue with navy accessories.
